As the sky darkens over Port-au-Prince, Haiti, many gather to watch *The Hope*, a Haitian Creole film which tells the Bible's message from Genesis through Jesus' life. Many stood or sat on rocky ground throughout the 85-minute movie.

A production team from Calvary Chapel Melbourne, FL, filmed a movie called *The Hope* in Creole, a language spoken by 80 percent of Haitians. After Haiti's devastating earthquake, a team from the church took the finished product, which featured

Haitian actors, to screen at numerous settings around the country. Many Haitians responded to the eternal hope portrayed in the film by placing their faith in its Subject.

"Our mission was to distribute the movie to churches and to both TV and radio stations.
